

# **CDBG-R SUBMISSION TEMPLATE** **& CHECKLIST**

The American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 ("Recovery Act") was signed into law by President Obama on February 17, 2009. The Recovery Act awards \$1 billion in CDBG Recovery (CDBG-R) funds to be distributed to cities, counties, insular areas and states, of which \$10 million has been reserved by HUD for its administrative costs and \$10 million of which will be awarded to Indian tribes. Recipients of the remaining \$980 million of CDBG-R funds will be the approximately 1,200 jurisdictions that received CDBG funding in Fiscal Year 2008. This template sets forth the suggested format for grantees receiving funds from CDBG-R. A complete submission contains the information requested below, including:

## **ENSURING RESPONSIBLE SPENDING OF RECOVERY ACT FUNDS**

Funding available under the Recovery Act has clear purposes – to stimulate the economy through measures that modernize the Nation’s infrastructure, improve energy efficiency, and expand educational opportunities and access to health care. HUD strongly urges grantees to use CDBG-R funds for hard development costs associated with infrastructure activities that provide basic services to residents or activities that promote energy efficiency and conservation through rehabilitation or retrofitting of existing buildings. While the full range of CDBG activities is available to grantees, the Department strongly suggests that grantees incorporate consideration of the public perception of the intent of the Recovery Act in identifying and selecting projects for CDBG-R funding.

### ***A. SPREADSHEET FOR REPORTING PROPOSED CDBG-R ACTIVITIES***

Grantees must provide information concerning CDBG-R assisted activities in an electronic spreadsheet provided by HUD. The information that must be reported in the spreadsheet includes activity name, activity description, CDBG-R dollar amount budgeted, eligibility category, national objective citation, additional Recovery Act funds for the activity received from other programs, and total activity budget. 1. ADA Ramps (Sidewalks).

- a) The requirements of Title XII of Division A identify the requirements for the use of Community Development Funds to carry out a Community Development Block Grant program under Title 1 of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974. This activity meets the purpose and all regulatory requirements of the Act.
- b) Section 1602 of the ARRA provides provisions related to a Tax Credit Exchange Program. This activity does not utilize the Tax Credit Exchange Program.
- c) This activity is not expected to create jobs but is expected to provide work for an estimated 15 employees. Although the activity may not maximize job creation, it does provide work for existing employees. The CDBG-R funds used for this activity will also support the jobs and businesses of suppliers and manufacturers of materials for the activity.
- d) The obligation of CDBG-R funds for this activity will provide business and work for those directly associated with this public facility activity. The funds will also have a local multiplier effect on the community, providing additional financial support to unrelated businesses and their employees.

- e) The ADA Ramps (Sidewalk) activity will help preserve infrastructure construction jobs through contracting for the project. The multiplier effect from the awarded contracts is expected to stimulate the local economy and promote economic recovery.
- f) Some of those most affected by the recession are construction workers. This activity will provide work for these workers and those in related fields.
- g) The investment of CDBG-R funds in this activity will increase economic efficiencies by improving safe pedestrian movement while eliminating sidewalk accessibilities barriers, especially for the elderly and disabled and the time consuming periodic replacement of non-accessible sidewalk.
- h) This infrastructure activity will create long term economic benefit by encouraging healthy exercise by pedestrians utilizing safe handicap accessible sidewalks.
- i) This activity has no effect on essential services and does not minimizes or avoid reductions in essential services.
- j) The improved pedestrian movement provided by new handicap sidewalk ramps may encourage residents to walk more, become less dependent on the use of motor vehicles, adopt a more New Urbanism life style, and thereby become more energy independent.

## 2. Glen Oak Impact Zone Sidewalks

- a) The requirements of Title XII of Division A identify the requirements for the use of Community Development Funds to carry out a Community Development Block Grant program under Title 1 of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974. This activity meets the purpose and all regulatory requirements of the Act.
- b) Section 1602 of the ARRA provides provisions related to a Tax Credit Exchange Program. This activity does not utilize the Tax Credit Exchange Program.
- c) This low income area benefit activity is not expected to create jobs but is expected to provide work for an estimated 15 employees. Although the activity may not maximize job creation, it does provide work for existing employees. The CDBG-R funds used for this activity will also support the jobs and businesses of suppliers and manufacturers of materials for the activity.
- d) The obligation of CDBG-R funds for this activity will provide business and work for those directly associated with the sidewalk activity. The funds will also have a local multiplier effect on the community, providing additional financial support to unrelated businesses and their employees.
- e) The ADA Ramp (Sidewalks) activity will help preserve infrastructure construction jobs through contracting for the project. The multiplier effect from the awarded contracts is expected to stimulate the local economy and promote economic recovery.
- f) Some of those most affected by the recession are street construction workers. This activity will provide work for these workers and those in related fields.
- g) The investment of CDBG-R funds in this activity will increase economic efficiencies by reducing or eliminating the need for repairs and the periodic replacement of sections of sidewalks.
- h) This infrastructure activity will create long term economic benefit by encouraging healthy exercise by pedestrians utilizing safe sidewalks.
- i) This activity has no effect on essential services and does not minimizes or avoid reductions in essential services.
- j) The improved pedestrian movement provided by new sidewalks will encourage neighborhood residents to walk more, become less dependent on the use of motor vehicles, promote the neighborhood as a model of New Urbanism, and thereby become more energy independent.

### 3. Fire Station 3 Rehabilitation

- a) The requirements of Title XII of Division A identify the requirements for the use of Community Development Funds to carry out a Community Development Block Grant program under Title 1 of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974. This activity meets the purpose and all regulatory requirements of the Act.
- b) Section 1602 of the ARRA provides provisions related to a Tax Credit Exchange Program. This activity does not utilize the Tax Credit Exchange Program.
- c) This public facility rehabilitation activity is not expected to create jobs but is expected to provide work for an estimated 3 employees. Although the activity may not maximize job creation, it does provide work for existing employees. The CDBG-R funds used for this activity will also support the jobs and businesses of suppliers and manufacturers of materials for the activity.
- d) The obligation of CDBG-R funds for this activity will provide business and work for those directly associated with this activity. The funds will also have a local multiplier effect on the community, providing additional financial support to unrelated businesses and their employees.
- e) The Fire Station 3 Rehabilitation activity will help preserve building specialist trade jobs as work is contracted out. The multiplier effect from the awarded contracts is expected to stimulate the local economy and promote economic recovery.
- f) Some of those most affected by the recession are employees in the building trades. This activity will provide work for these workers and those in related fields.
- g) The investment of CDBG-R funds in this activity will increase economic efficiencies by reducing or eliminating the need for repairs to this older fire station. Instead of making repairs, deteriorated items will be replaced to insure the long term utility of the facility. The low flow fixtures will lower water utilization and associated utility costs.
- h) This public facility rehabilitation activity will create long term economic benefit by insuring the fire station remains a healthy place to work and economical public building serving the needs of a low income area and the low flow water usage fixtures will lower utility costs.
- i) This activity has no effect on essential services and does not minimize or avoid reductions in essential services.
- j) The low flow fixtures installed at the fire facility will have a positive effect on energy independence since it will require less energy to process a lower level of waste water.

### 4. Fire Station 8 Rehabilitation

- a) The requirements of Title XII of Division A identify the requirements for the use of Community Development Funds to carry out a Community Development Block Grant program under Title 1 of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974. This activity meets the purpose and all regulatory requirements of the Act.
- b) Section 1602 of the ARRA provides provisions related to a Tax Credit Exchange Program. This activity does not utilize the Tax Credit Exchange Program.
- c) This public facility rehabilitation activity is not expected to create jobs but is expected to provide work for an estimated 5 employees. Although the activity may not maximize job creation, it does provide work for existing employees. The CDBG-R funds used for this activity will also support the jobs and businesses of suppliers and manufacturers of materials for the activity.
- d) The obligation of CDBG-R funds for this activity will provide business and work for those directly associated with this activity. The funds will also have a local multiplier effect on the community, providing additional financial support to unrelated businesses and their employees.

- e) The Fire Station 8 Rehabilitation activity will help preserve building specialist trade jobs, including plumbers and roofers, as work is contracted out. The multiplier effect from the awarded contracts is expected to stimulate the local economy and promote economic recovery.
  - f) Some of those most affected by the recession are employees in the building trades. This activity will provide work for these workers and those in related fields.
  - g) The investment of CDBG-R funds in this activity will increase economic efficiencies by reducing or eliminating the need for repairs to this older fire station. Instead of making repairs, deteriorated items will be replaced to insure the long term utility of the facility. The new white roof will reduce building cooling costs and the low flow fixtures will lower water utilization and associated utility costs.
  - h) This public facility rehabilitation activity will create long term economic benefit to the City of Peoria by lowering water usage charges through the installation of low flow fixtures and lower electrical cooling expenses with the installation of a new white roof.
  - i) This activity has a positive effect on essential services and does not minimize or avoid reductions in essential services. The activity includes a new roof, which is needed to preserve the fire station.
  - j) The low flow fixtures and new white roof installed at the fire facility will have a positive effect on energy independence since it will require less energy to process a lower level of waste water and lower electrical demands to cool the building.
5. Center for the Prevention of Abuse Roof
- a) The requirements of Title XII of Division A identify the requirements for the use of Community Development Funds to carry out a Community Development Block Grant program under Title 1 of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974. This activity meets the purpose and all regulatory requirements of the Act.
  - b) Section 1602 of the ARRA provides provisions related to a Tax Credit Exchange Program. This activity does not utilize the Tax Credit Exchange Program.
  - c) This public service facility rehabilitation activity is not expected to create jobs but is expected to provide work for an estimated 2 employees. Although the activity may not maximize job creation, it does provide work for existing employees. The CDBG-R funds used for this activity will also support the jobs and businesses of suppliers and manufacturers of materials for the activity.
  - d) The obligation of CDBG-R funds for this activity will provide business and work for those directly associated with this activity. The funds will also have a local multiplier effect on the community, providing additional financial support to unrelated businesses and their employees.
  - e) The Center for the Prevention of Abuse Roof activity will help preserve roofing trade jobs. The multiplier effect from the awarded contracts is expected to stimulate the local economy and promote economic recovery.
  - f) Some of those most affected by the recession are employees in the building trades. This activity will provide work for roofers and those in related fields.
  - g) The investment of CDBG-R funds in this activity will increase economic efficiencies by reducing or eliminating the need for repairs to this older fire station. Instead of making repairs, deteriorated items will be replaced to insure the long term utility of the facility. The new white roof will reduce building cooling costs and the low flow fixtures will lower water utilization and associated utility costs.
  - h) This public facility rehabilitation activity will create long term economic benefit to the agency by preserving the building from the harmful effects of roof leaks.

- i) This activity has a positive effect on essential services and does not minimize or avoid reductions in essential services. The new roof on the facility will help insure there is a shelter and services for abused people.
  - j) The new roof installed at this public facility will have a positive effect on energy independence since it will save on energy costs associated from the damage of a leaking roof.

1. ADA Ramps (Sidewalks).

- a) This pedestrian oriented activity will promote energy conservation by encouraging the use of safe, handicap accessible sidewalks, thus providing an alternative to vehicle usage, especially for elderly and disabled residents.
- b) Smart growth encourages the reuse and revitalization of established residential neighborhoods. This includes the utilization of existing infrastructure, including improved sidewalks. The ADA Ramps (Sidewalk) activity will improve the usage of existing infrastructure, sidewalks, especially by the elderly and disabled residents in wheelchairs.
- c) This activity does not utilize green building technologies.
- d) Improved accessibility on sidewalks encourages the use of wheelchairs and walking, both of which create no pollution emissions.

2. Glen Oak Impact Zone Sidewalks

- a) This sidewalk improvement activity will promote energy conservation by constructing safe sidewalks, thus providing an alternative to vehicle usage.
- b) Smart growth encourages the reuse and revitalization of established residential neighborhoods. This includes the utilization of existing infrastructure, including sidewalks. The Glen Oak Impact Zone Sidewalks activity will replace old,

deteriorating sidewalks in this low income neighborhood with new, safe walks to promote, in part, smart growth principals and the market desirability of this older neighborhood.

- c) This activity does not utilize green building technologies.
- d) Improved sidewalks encourage walking and the use of wheelchairs as a means of getting around. Neither of these modes of transportation create pollution emissions.

### 3. Fire Station 3 Rehabilitation

- a) This public facility improvement activity will promote energy conservation through the installation of low flow water fixtures.
- b) Smart growth encourages the reuse and revitalization of existing facilities in established residential neighborhoods. The continued use of this Fire Station complements the Smart Growth philosophy.
- c) Fire Station 3 activities will utilize green energy technologies in replacing existing plumbing fixtures with low flow fixtures.
- d) This activity has no impact on and does not reduce pollution emissions.

### 4. Fire Station 8 Rehabilitation

- a) This public facility improvement activity promotes energy conservation through the installation of low flow water fixtures and white, heat reflective roof.
- b) Smart growth encourages the reuse and revitalization of existing facilities in established residential neighborhoods. The continued use of this Fire Station complements the Smart Growth philosophy.
- c) Fire Station 8 activities include utilizing green energy technologies in replacing plumbing fixtures with low flow fixtures and installing a white, solar reflective roof.
- d) This activity has a positive impact on reducing pollution emissions. The installation of a white, solar heat reflective roof is expected to reduce electric cooling consumption, resulting in a lower demand on electrical production and related pollution.

### 5. Center for the Prevention of Abuse Roof

- a) This public service building improvement activity promotes energy conservation through the installation of a new roof.
- b) Smart growth encourages the reuse of existing facilities. The continued use of this facility requires a roof to be installed.
- c) This activity does not utilize green building technologies.
- d) This activity has a positive impact on reducing pollution emissions through the installation of a white, solar heat reflective roof.
