## **WHAT IS NEIGHBORHOOD WATCH?**

Neighborhood Watch is crime prevention program that:

- Teaches citizens techniques to reduce the risk of being victimized at home and in public.
- Trains citizens on the importance of recognizing suspicious activities and how to report them.
- Teaches participants how to make their homes more secure and properly identify their property.
- Allows neighbors to get to know each other and their routine so that any out of place activity can be reported and investigated.
- Creates a cohesive body of concerned citizens addressing issues that concern the entire community.

## **WHAT NEIGHBORHOOD WATCH IS NOT?**

- Not a vigilante group working doing law enforcement.
- Not a program designed for participants to take personal risks to prevent crime.

## **HERE'S WHAT YOU WILL GET ONCE YOU BECOME AN ESTABLISHED NEIGHBORHOOD WATCH GROUP:**

- Blue Eye Neighborhood Watch signs
- Neighborhood Watch brochures and education materials
- Education and training by police
- Assistance from the neighborhood division
- Know your neighbors

## **ACTION STEPS TO ORGANIZE A NEIGHBORHOOD WATCH**

1. **INFORMAL SURVEY:** Talk with your neighbors and area business owners to inquire about their concerns, and their willingness to contribute to a neighborhood watch.
2. **HOLD A START-UP MEETING** with your neighbors to gauge their interest in starting a watch group. Consider inviting representatives from local churches, schools and businesses. (City staff are available to attend a meeting to discuss Neighborhood Watch.)
3. **IDENTIFY** activities that the neighborhood watch may take on including community clean-ups, block parties, community gardens, street lighting, code enforcement, and youth recreation.
4. **CONTACT** Steve Fairbanks at the Neighborhood Services Unit (494-8250) for need assistance to organizing a meeting and to host a kick-off event.

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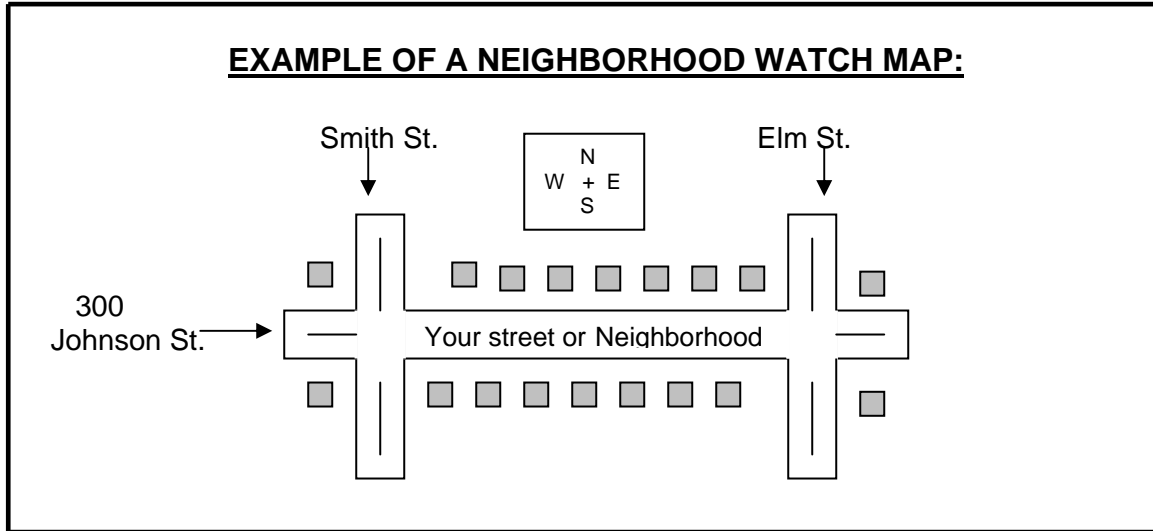
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## NEIGHBORHOOD WATCH GROUP BOUNDARIES
